The spinal cord is mainly affected at the levels corresponding to the dermatomal distribution of the cutaneous rash, although extensive longitudinal involvement of the spinal cord may occur. Spinal cord lesions are typically hyperintense on T2-weighted and T2-weighted FLAIR images and may intensely enhance after administration of MRI contrast material (Fig. 5).

Behçet's disease is a systemic vasculitis of unknown aetiology characteristically affecting venules. 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Sacroccocygeal teratoma (SCT) is a type of tumor known as a teratoma that develops at the base of the coccyx (tailbone) and is thought to be derived from the primitive streak [citation needed]. Sacroccocygeal teratomas are benign 75% of the time, malignant 12% of the time, and the remainder are considered "immature teratomas" that share benign and malignant features.

Spine is the most common location for cancer metastasis in the skeletal system, and occurs in approximately 33% of the metastatic cancer patients. 1 In the skeletal system, most metastases are located in the thoracic and lumbar segments, whereas cervical metastatic cancer only constitutes 8%
